SOME INFORMATION ABOUT THE BALINESE CAT

Thank you so much for your interest in our lovely Balinese. We think they are truly exceptional animals. They have created quite a stir of interest among cat lovers in the past few years due to their great beauty and lovine week.

The question most Often scheed at shows and among our funders in. "What is the difference between the Balinese and a Himilayan." It Minimalyon, well shown across the country, it a Perinary poet with Samese coloring. As such, it is judged by the Persins standard (short, cobby body, wide shead, short nones, short that found eyes with a suevet expression, It was developed by Mrs. Marquerica Gofforth of La Mess. California, who crossed Persians with Samese and worked for many years to perfect this beautiful cut with its rich Persian cost.

The Balinese, on the other hand, is pure Siamese cat. No other breed has been crossed with it to achieve the long cost. Consequently, it is judged by the Siamese standard (body) ing and tills, long gea and tail, almoad shaped eyes, wedge-shaped head). The only difference is that the Balinese has long, very soft silky hair. This long hair has come from mustations - that is to say, long haired kittens have turned up spontaneously among pure-bred, pedigreed Siamese litters. These unusual kittens have been treasured by a few breeders and by carefully breeding long-haired Siamese to long-haired Siamese they proved that this cats will breed true, all long-haired.

Due to the efforts of these pioneers, the Balinese were officially recognized by the Cat Fanciers' Federation, and a standard was published for them in 1963.

Since then all the associations have recognized the Balinese.

The Balinase make the most perfect pets one could such for. Their coast are much easier to keep in order than might loop-hair' at they are more "flowing", not so deue and do not mat. Also they do not shed, even as much as some short hairs. Depending on the climate in your area, they may shed briefly, once a year; but most of the time you can used black or nawy blae with inspantly even if your home boosts several Balineae. They are very intelligent and likely and like their Siemnete forbears, night yaking part in their owners activities. But they tend to be a little quieter than the average Siamees. Not to say they aren't chally when upoken to. You'll always get a response from these long-haired Siamees; but you'll get fewer demands. They are wonderfully gentle and affectionate. We have never heard of a "mean" one.

The best known bloodlines to date are the Rai-Mars, pioneered by Mr. & Mrs. Raymond Dorsey of Torrance, Calif, non-retired, and the Iollanda's Farm which has some Rai-Mar blood. Mrs. Helen Smith the creator of the name "Ballnese", is also a pioneer with her own bloodline. She has some of the few Glocolate Points available, so far at her cattery in Seaford, New York. There is the Publish in the Part Julia, Oklahoma; and Yerde, which is part Draheim. E.L.C. Kats of Holiday, Florida, and El Gato of Wooster, Ohio, have their own mutation and many catteries in this country and Canada, such as Ti-May. Chen Y. Ch. Bo-Ockide and Planta, we ownlying with and combining the established bloodlines.
